## Case Narrative Report

On 03/14/10 at 0320 hours I was on patrol traveling westbound on South St. when I witnessed a vehicle in front of me crossing the double yellow line, drifting back to the right lane, then crossing the double yellow line again. I then caught up to the vehicle to see that it had an Ohio registration [REDACTED]. The vehicle was a 1995 Mercury 4 Door, Gold in color.

The vehicle slowed down coming to a stop approximately 100 yards from the South St. at McKinley Ave. intersection. I then activated my emergency lights to initiate a traffic stop. I then opened my door and heard the engine of the suspect's vehicle rev up. The vehicle then started to continue westbound towards McKinley Ave. I then activated my siren as dispatch advised me that this vehicle was reported stolen earlier in the night by the Miami Co. Sheriff's Office. The vehicle then approached a red light at the McKinley Ave. intersection and did not slow down or stop. The vehicle then continued westbound till it turned onto the 500 block of Gray St. As I was updating dispatch of my location and situation, the vehicle then pulled into the yard of 535 Gray St.

Knowing the car was reported stolen and suspecting the driver was under the influence of a drug or an alcoholic beverage, I removed my service weapon from the holster pointing it at the driver of the vehicle. I was able to see there was only one person in the vehicle. I then ordered the driver to remove the keys from the ignition and throw them out of the vehicle. Not knowing if the driver was going to continue to attempt to flee I ordered them out of the vehicle with their hands in the air. I then ordered the driver to walk backwards to my location and face forward with their hands on their head. As Officer Short arrived I ordered the driver to their knee's where I then placed them in handcuffs, checking for proper fit and double locking the cuffs. Officer Short and Officer Cantrell then cleared the vehicle to make sure there were no passengers.

The driver was identified as [REDACTED], 03/08/69. [REDACTED] had a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage and could not walk well. She was very off balance. [REDACTED] immediately became belligerent using profanity towards me and the other officers. [REDACTED]'s speech was very slurred and mumbled her words together. When checking the vehicle there was an open 12oz can of Bud Light, which was taken for evidence.

I then transported [REDACTED] to station where she was read and shown the BMV 2255 form. This was witnessed by Deputy Brazel. After the 20 minute observation period [REDACTED] refused to give a chemical test. She was notified she was under an

Administrative license suspension. [REDACTED] was then transported to jail by Deputy Brazel.

[REDACTED] was charged with Failure to Comply With Order Or Signal Of A Police Officer, ORC 2921.331B a third degree felony, Open Container, ORC 4301.62B, a minor misdemeanor. [REDACTED] was also charged with OVI, ORC 4511.19A1a, Failure to reinstate, ORC 4510.21A, Driving Left Of Centerline, ORC 4511.29 and also a Red Light violation, ORC 4511.13C1. She was incarcerated on those charges. A CCH was requested as well as a certified copy of [REDACTED]'s driving record. This traffic stop and traffic violations was recorded on video and also added to the case file.

On March 14, 2010 at 0110 hours, I was dispatched to 523 Wood in reference to loud music. The caller, [REDACTED], was at [REDACTED] Wood. When I arrived, I parked across the street in the Tasty Treat lot and could hear the music coming from the apartment. I spoke to [REDACTED] who said this happens very often.

I saw the back door to the upstairs apartment was open and went up the stairs. I knocked for several minutes but it wasn't until there was break in the music that the resident came to the door. I saw [REDACTED] come to the door and saw another W/M and a W/F inside. I asked if it was his apartment and he said yes. I told Mr. [REDACTED] about the complaint and he had to turn the music down. I warned him for the noise if it continued. He said ok and slammed the door shut. The music was down for only about a minute and then turned back up. I knocked some more on the door but no one answered.

After some time, I went to the front outer door and it was unlocked. I entered and went up the stairs to the inner door and knocked. [REDACTED] came to the door and began yelling through the door, that I was trespassing, even though I hadn't entered the apartment. He told me to get out and I told him to shut the music down. The other male was standing there and I again saw the female looking at me. I warned [REDACTED] for Disorderly Conduct for his loud, abusive behavior and causing the disturbance with his music. It was turned down for only a minute or so again. As I exited the outer door, it was shut and locked behind me, then the music turned back up.

Officer Short arrived and we again went to both doors trying to get compliance with the noise ordinance. Dispatch advised that [REDACTED] called in and said he would shoot officers that came back inside. Officer Rodriguez was advised of this call and requested a copy from the dispatch center. I later listened to this and he clearly stated, "I'm going to shoot to kill" if police came in without a warrant. He was yelled at by the dispatch center for his demeanor.

We waited outside for sometime and saw the occupants, and once specifically, [REDACTED], waving at us from the front window. He pulled the blinds out and waved. He would not respond to our requests to come out.

I advised Mr. [REDACTED] of the situation but that [REDACTED] would be charged for this disturbance.

I prepared charges of Disturbing the Peace (Loud Stereo) 132.31A. This was filed as an M-4 due to a previous conviction on 2-1-2010. I also charged [REDACTED] with Obstructing Official Business (2921.31A/M-2). I requested a warrant, as I could not get him out of the house to arrest him.

On March 13, 2010 at approximately 0247 hours, while on routine patrol eastbound in the 300 block of East Ash Street, I observed a vehicle traveling westbound in the 400 block of East Ash Street at a high rate of speed. I activated my radar unit and tracked the vehicle going 58 miles per hour in a 25 mile per hour zone. As the vehicle was approaching, it traveled near the double yellow line almost striking my driver's side mirror. I turned my vehicle around activating my emergency lights and siren and as I got turned around, I observed the vehicle turn southbound onto Harrison Street not using a turn signal. I radioed out my location and advised dispatch that I was attempting to catch up to a vehicle that was traveling at a high rate of speed on East Ash Street and I described the vehicle as a blue Cadillac.

As I turned onto Harrison from East Ash Street, I observed the vehicle come to a complete stop with the back passenger tire brushing the curb. As I got next to the suspect vehicle the driver of the vehicle, [REDACTED] was exiting the car as I started to exit my cruiser. As [REDACTED] was exiting his car he appeared to have a difficult time getting out of the car and was swaying while he was standing there. I asked [REDACTED] if he knew why I had stopped him, and he advised that he was speeding through the area. As I was talking to [REDACTED], I could smell a strong odor of alcoholic beverage coming from him and I asked him how much he had to drink tonight, and he stated that he had a couple. I asked [REDACTED] if he would submit to some field sobriety tests to see if he was okay to drive this evening and escorted him to the sidewalk in front of his residence at [REDACTED] Harrison Street.

As I was talking to [REDACTED], it was hard to understand him and I had to ask him on a couple occasions to repeat himself because he had slurred and mumbled speech. The first test that I explained and demonstrated was the HGN test, which I received clues in both the right and left eye for distinct nystagmus at maximum deviation, a lack of smooth pursuit, and onset of nystagmus before 45 degrees. The next test that I explained and demonstrated was the one-leg stand skills test. [REDACTED] advised he has flat feet and had poor balance even before this had happened. I asked [REDACTED] if he would be able to submit to the test, and he advised that he would try. [REDACTED] swayed while balancing, put his foot down after the count of one, and could not do the test, and started to make excuses why he could not complete the test.

I asked [REDACTED] if he would be able to submit to any more field test, and he stated that he would not. I advised him that he was going to be placed in custody for OVI, and

then he asked if it would matter if he even attempted another test, and I told him at this time probably not.

At 0252 hours I placed [REDACTED] in custody, handcuffed him behind his back, double locking the handcuffs. I placed [REDACTED] in the back seat of my patrol car and Officer Short secured [REDACTED] vehicle by turning off his lights and locking the doors.

I transported [REDACTED] back to the Piqua Police Department, escorted him into the booking area. Officer Short fingerprinted and photographed Nathan. I then read and showed [REDACTED] a copy of the BMV 2255. [REDACTED] provided a breath test at 0328 hours with a test result of .212 BAC.

I read [REDACTED] statement of his Miranda rights and he waived those rights and stated that he would speak to me reference the optional influence report. [REDACTED] stated that he had started drinking beer at Bings Bar at approximately 1900 hours and stopped drinking beers right before I pulled him over. I asked [REDACTED] if thought that he was under the influence of alcoholic beverage now, and he stated that he assumed so since my test stated that he was. I asked [REDACTED] how many beers he had tonight, and first he told me to write down as many as I wanted and then stated that he couldn't remember how many that he had this evening.

I cited [REDACTED] for speed, ORC PCO 73.10a, OVI, ORC 4511.19a1 and Prohibited BAC over .18, ORC 4511.19a1h. Nathan was given a court date into Miami County Municipal Court on March 17, 2010 at 0900 hours. [REDACTED] was released to a sober friend. [REDACTED]'s driver's license was confiscated. He was also placed under an ALS suspension. [REDACTED] has no current CCH.
